**CHILDREN'S SUMMER LEARNING:
HOW THE CHALLENGE WORKS**

- This year children ages 3 or 11 can choose which challenge they want to participate in and can register at any YCL branch, the Bookmobile, or online, starting May 7. Visit yclibrary.org to use our fun, interactive Beanstack service.
- Pick up a reading record and add a sticker for every 12 minutes you read or listen to an audiobook for a required total of 10 hours. You may also track progress online using your Beanstack account.
- Log all hours online or return the completed record by July 27 to receive a summer learning challenge medal, a certificate, a kazoo, and rock star sunglasses.
- Each time you complete the challenge, you'll be entered in the Grand Prize Drawing at the end of the program. One randomly-selected winner from each branch library receives a \$50 Books-A-Mil-

lion gift card, an inflatable guitar, a tambourine, a drawstring book bag, and additional incentives from our sponsors. Receive an extra entry each time the 10-hour reading requirement is completed.

**TINY TOTS EARLY LITERACY:
HOW THE CHALLENGE WORKS**

- Register and participate in the Tiny Tots Challenge with your baby, age 3 or under, at any branch library, the Bookmobile, or online at yclibrary.org using the Beanstack service.
- Track your progress as you complete the required 20 literacy activities together by July 27 and your baby will receive a board book, a certificate, and a bath toy.
- Each time you complete the challenge, you'll be entered in our Grand Prize Drawing at the end of the program. One randomly-selected winner from each library will receive a \$50 Books-A-Million gift card, a coupon for free admis-


- Registration starts May 7, which gives everyone plenty of time to get signed up before the challenge begins.

Beginning June 4, pick up a reading record to record your hours of reading or track your progress online.

Log the required 15 hours of reading online or turn in your reading record by July 27 to receive a \$5 gift card to a local business and be entered in the grand prize drawing. To find the games in our online catalog, choose “software and video games” as a format in a basic




search. The games can be checked out for 2 weeks, with a limit of 2 games per card.

Check out the newest award-winners! The American Library Association recently announced its list of Youth Media Award-winning books. All of these titles are available from YCL.


- *Hello, Universe*, written by Erin Entrada Kelly, won the Newbery Medal for the most outstanding contribution to children's literature.

- *We Are Okay*, written by Nina LaCour, won the Printz Award for excellence in literature written for young adults.


TAKE A PEEK INSIDE THE YCL BOOKMOBILE!

NEW SPECIALIZED STORYTIMES

Many studies have been conducted explaining what all librarians across the country already know — everyone benefits from storytimes. From the very beginning of the York County Library system, librarians have held storytimes, reading well over thousands of books to children at all our locations. Our librarians have been so successful at this art form, those children are now coming back as adults to enjoy storytimes with their own children.

YCL is now expanding these offerings to include more specialized sessions, such as sensory and Spanish

bilingual language storytimes. Such storytimes are founded on the traditional ones we still offer, but with a little more. Just this year, we have served many of our children across the county with these specialized storytimes.

“Uno, dos, tres deditos ... One, two, three little fingers ...” has recently become a favorite amongst our Spanish bilingual participants. And, like the studies about storytimes, there are studies confirming the benefits of bilingualism that, again, all librarians already knew.

You can now print to any YCL location from your mobile device or anywhere with internet access using our website, your email, or a mobile app. The cost is 15¢ per page for black and white or 25¢ for color. Printing through our website or by email does not require installation of any software.
